

St. Mary's Wheels keep rolling at Cycling

On September 29, 18 St. Mary's County athletes participated in the Special Olympics Maryland cycling competition at the Maryland State Police Training Center in Sykesville.

The annual event attracted over 50 cyclists from across the state to compete in 500 meter and 1K time trials, and 5K and 10K road races using two-wheel and three-wheel bicycles. This year's event also included Junior Nationals races sponsored by the US Cycling Federation.

The local athletes included seasoned riders as well as athletes riding for the first time. They have been practicing for several weeks in the parking lot of Leonardtown High School and the Hollywood Fire House under the guidance of Coach Connie Thompson, Brent Barbour, Jim Russell, Don Bewick, Matt Menard, Charlie Jackson, Tom Maras, Marcia Bald, and Mark Fondren.

races. Athletes were grouped in heats based on previous training scores.

The local Special Olympics program is proud of all of the athletes who trained this year and improved their skills. We are thankful to Leonardtown High School and Hollywood Fire House for allowing us to use the facilities for training. We are most appreciative to the volunteers, parents, and local volunteers. With their continued support, the program continues to grow in St. Mary's.

Brueggemann Honored at United Way Breakfast

This past year, she pulled off an amazing fundraiser, almost single-handed, in a short time frame in addition to her other year-round support of Special Olympics.

Penny developed the concept of an "escape to Key West" day in St. Mary's County. She booked the Key West Band, secured the largest facility in the county, got tickets printed, got posters printed and distributed, established e-mail traffic, arranged for all the food, decorations, prizes, entertainment, photos, and publicity. She involved the local County Government, had PSA spots on the radio stations and on cable TV. She convinced the Navy Commander of the Naval Air Station to be the master of ceremonies! She established a phone line to attendees to call and get tickets. And she did all of this in less than 60 days. The event drew over 300 attendees and raised over \$6,000.

Penny is the year-round liaison with the Patuxent River Naval Air Station and coordinates volunteers for Special Olympics. For the local spring games, she helps obtain over 200 volunteers. She routinely finds donations and sponsorships which are so valuable to keeping the program alive. When the awards stands needed painting, she found 5 members of the construction division to "get the job done" in just a few hours. State Honors Local Athlete and Volunteers

Each year, Special Olympics Maryland solicits nominations from across the state looking for some of its most dedicated, passionate, and energetic supporters. A committee reviews all of the entries and selects a winner for each category and awards are presented at the annual Awards Banquet. This year, Special Olympics St. Mary's County representatives were chosen for four of these awards.



Angela Pitts was selected as the Female Athlete of the Year for the State. She is a woman who works hard, plays fair, is quiet and patient, and is always looking for ways to please her coaches and teammates. At practice, you can always count on Angela being there on time, helping to get equipment set up

and cleaned up, and assisting other athletes during stretches. Angela broke her wrist this year, but that didn't keep her from basketball practice. She used her good hand to dribble and pass with friends. Her wrist was better for the spring season and she looked forward to be back to her routine. "How did I do today," is her question when practice is over. Her smile lights up a room. She gives of herself to help others and still works hard to improve herself, no matter what her age.

Gwen Guy was chosen as the Coach of the Year. She works full time for Booz-Allen & Hamilton, the major

sponsor of our spring games. She is a certified Special Olympics coach in aquatics, snowshoeing, golf, and kayaking.

She was the head aquatics coach this year. She coordinated the beginners program for over 50 athletes, then the training for about 25 intermediate and advanced athletes; 12 of whom traveled to the state competition. She was an assistant coach for kayaking. She was the coach for



our first season of snowshoeing. She participated in the demonstration event for unified snowshoers and chose the uphill course.

Gwen is a golf coach and takes an athlete on the course playing 9-holes alternate shot (an athlete that has just moved up from skills). Their team won the gold medal this year. Her enthusiasm is contagious – she is always cheerful. She inspires courage in the athletes by requesting that they do their best and works side by side with them – whether on the snow, or in the pool. In swimming; Gwen swam beside our athletes, showing them how to do the butterfly and breast stroke. The result was having athletes do the 100 meter medley race – a first for St. Mary's County.

TJ Parkes was chosen as the volunteer of the year. She performs many functions in St. Mary's County. She is the head coach for kayaking. She has been a Ski coach and partner for an athlete with a sit ski for about 10 years. During the past two years, she has organized a team of volunteers who used wagons during a craft fair to sell bottled water. The first year, it was a rainy weekend, and they still sold 800 bottles. As a seamstress, she has helped our athletes prepare for special events. At the 2006 Winter Games, she made poodle skirts for the 50's



dance, the next year she made ponchos for the Mexican theme. For the 2007 Sailing/Kayaking Regatta, she spent the entire weekend on the water as a stager for kayaking.

She also has a knack for organizing and preparing food. For the local basketball tournament, she got

donations, bought all the pieces, cooked that day, coordinated all the volunteers, set up, and cleaned up. She also managed all of the food for the local soccer tournament and ran the concession stand at our Spring Games (about 1,000 people).


